
Is CAPVA part of a continuum?





9,6% of high school students (11.7% female, 7.2% male) reported being physically hurt on purpose by a person they went out with in the 12 months before the survey.



Child & adolescent to parent violence & abuse (CAPVA)

CAPVA


According to the London Violence Reduction Unit

- 40% of those experiencing CAPVA refuse to report it
- The majority of CAPVA cases involve **boys in late adolescence and their mothers** and is most likely to be **physical violence**
- Parents/carers interviewed said they only contacted the police at crisis points when they felt they had no other choice and were afraid for their physical safety
- All parents/carers affected said they had experienced multiple incidents of violence before reaching the crisis point

In a **youth offending** sample, Respect and Numbers for Good found the **prevalence of CAPVA** in caseloads was **21-27%** and in **64-67%** of police **domestic abuse incidents** where the suspect was **under 18**. There were also significant levels of CAPVA reported in Children's Social Care, including Early Help caseloads.

Between 6 March 2019 and 4 January 2020, Northumbria Police responded to an average of **two incidents of CAPVA per day** (515 total).

RESPECT'S model of intervention



Adult Perpetrator Work

TIME FRAME

Concrete perpetrator work can take quite different forms. However, it usually involves individual or group work over at least 6 months.

GOAL

Perpetrator work aims to increase the safety and well-being of women and children and to stop violence.

APPROACH

Programmes work on increasing perpetrators' self-reflection skills, teaching non-violent coping strategies, and addressing violence and its links to toxic masculinity.

COOPERATION

For effective risk management, programmes need to cooperate with all organisations involved in the intervention (e. g. victim support services, child services, probation).

Youth Perpetrator Work

TIME FRAME

Concrete perpetrator work can take quite different forms. However, it usually involves individual, family support or group work with modular formats that engage and work with an open door approach

GOAL

Youth Perpetrator work aims to stop violence increase safety for families and provide youth with a different understanding and tools to change behavior


APPROACH

Programmes work on increasing young perpetrators' self-reflection skills, teaching non-violent coping strategies, and addressing violence and its links to toxic masculinity. Intervention need to be modular, engaging and digitally informed

SYSTEMIC

For effective intervention and risk management, programmes need to cooperate with families, schools, and all organisations involved in the intervention (e. g. child support services, mental health, addiction and family services).
